LIVERPOOL CAMRA **CAMRA National Chair Colin Valentine Speaks in Liverpool**

In July Colin Valentine the **Chair of National CAMRA** spoke at a Regional CAMRA meeting held at the Augustus John in Liverpool.


Guest speaker Colin spoke for over an hour outlining the future plans and structure of CAMRA. He was keen

to stress the importance of local volunteers in achieving CAMRA's objectives.

140.000 Members

The Campaign had seen a massive increase in membership to 140,000 members. This gave the Campaign considerable strength in bringing influence to bear on MPs and industry figures, with MPs realising that

CAMRA members were a significant percentage of their constituency voters. This had helped bring pressure to bear on MPs to support the push for an independent review of the way in which the PubCos were operating, especially with regard to the controversial beer tie and rent regime that was impacting adversely on many of their pubs. Pressure needed to be maintained as despite success in convincing MPs to maintain debate in the House of Commons, the Coalition Government had yet to take effective action on PubCos. Other important political objectives to support pubs were the community right to buy legislation, greater planning protection for pubs from change of use and the dropping of the beer Duty Escalator (see petition on page 53).



He was emphatic that for CAMRA, national and local campaigning were one and the same thing and that "We will spend money on focused campaigns as part of a five year strategy". A strategic review had been undertaken and five main campaign objectives identified.

Importance of Branch Magazines

He stressed the importance of local CAMRA magazines in reaching the wider public audience and bringing CAMRA to the attention of pub goers generally and not just CAMRA members. "If your print run is 10,000 copies, then 40,000 people are reading your magazine" he said.

> Wetherspoon vouchers had helped with membership recruitment and had also boosted real ale sales in wetherspoon pubs, with real ale now accounting for 20% of Wetherspoon beer sales compared with 13% in pubs generally.

Unfortunately the length of Colin's speech precluded much

time for many questions, such as the controversial issue of so called "Craft Beer", the promotion of student membership of CAMRA including students being able to have membership of two CAMRA branches, both at college and at their home, and the role of Branches in developing campaigns.

A group of Liverpool members had the opportunity to take Colin to the current and former Liverpool Pubs of the Year, the Roscoe Head and the Dispensary, to continue discussion and to give Colin a view from the local branch perspective before he had to hurry for his train home to Edinburgh.

Caledonian Regional Director Derek Coalter presented current licensee Carol Ross with the





Cask Boddies Dead and Buried?

Boddingtons cask bitter appears to be dead and buried. The beer was brewed on contract by Hydes of Manchester for the current owners the multinational AB - InBev. but that deal came to an end in March 2012 and no other cask brewing arrangements have been put in place. The canned and smooth flow versions are brewed in South Wales. AB - InBev revealed that cask Boddingtons, once an acclaimed must seek out real ale in the 1970s, now only accounts for 5% of the Boddington brand sales, the rest being cans and smoothflow.

Stan Eaton, licensee at the Old Black Bull Preston, has served cask Boddingtons for over 20 years. Originally he was selling 6,000 pints a week and now it was just 600 before the current failure of AB -InBev to supply any cask Boddingtons.

Stan commented;

"In my opinion it has become very clear over the past few years that AB - Inbev doesn't want anything to do with the cask Boddingtons. They only seem to care about the cans, which they then put on ridiculous price promotions in supermarkets." Liverpool Higsonians will recall that

Boddingtons was the company that Higsons sold out to, and which then in turn sold out Higsons to Whitbread, resulting in the closure of the Higsons Brewery.

The Cream of Manchester is well curdled.

The Ship & Mitre on Dale St celebrated the Olympic Torch relay by having one of the torches on display in the pub and its shops to raise money for the Meningitis Research Foundation. Pub regular Steve Taylor was nominated to run with the Olympic torch on 31st May



and loaned the torch to the Ship. Steve was doing a 54 mile run with friend Barry which recreated Barry's mercy dash to Newry hospital from Speke after his four week old baby boy had been admitted to hospital with suspected meningitis. With the amazing work of the doctors and nurses Callum went on to make a full recovery . The run took place during a Meningitis Awareness Week and they were hoping to gain significant media coverage which will support the national awareness week.





Stamps brewery is Merseyside's latest Microbrewery. The brewery is a natural progression from the success of running two cask beer driven bars, Stamps Bar and **Stamps Too**, for several years.

Both bars have specialised in real ale, having 12 hand pumps between them. They have always promoted local breweries sited within the Merseyside area. The establishment of a brewery



supplying quality ales to both bars seems to be the way forward, especially as real ale is presently enjoying a renaissance.

Stamps are determined to produce quality beers, mostlyn of a blonde nature. If cask beers are to survive and expand, they need to attract more young and female drinkers, and they believe that good quality blonde/pale beers will help to do this.

Stamps brewery aims to be as carbon neutral as possible. The building they are established in

will have solar panels installed, will use air source pumps and will harvest rain water for cleaning purposes. Their aim is to be as green as possible.

Brewery Tours

Stamps brewery is small, and so brewery tours will be limited to 15 people. Tours have to be booked in advance. The brewing process will be explained to you and samples of Stamps beers will be available. You will have an opportunity to 'help out ' if you wish. More details at www.stampsbrewery.co.uk





Renshaw Street Wet Zone Drinking Row

A row has broken out over the creation by Liverpool City Council of a designated "wet zone" drinking area for "street drinkers" on vacant land at the corner of Renshaw Street and Leece Street. Local businesses including pubs and restaurants have complained, and have acused the Council of being "underhand" and of "failing to consult" regard the introduction of the wet zone. This is now in operation for a 28 day trial period. A marquee is being erected with an entrance on Back Renshaw Street.

Around 50 people attended a meeting on Tuesday 28th August and pressed the Council to drop the plan. Ben Scott, owner of Ben Scott barbers on Leece Street, claimed that the views of businesses had been ignored by the Council.

"It was a PR exercise. This trial will go ahead whether we like it or not"

Councillor Nick Small commented:

"Where we left it is that the proposals will go ahead and we will meet again once it is up and running to see how it is going.......Doing nothing is not an option on this."

MerseyAle will report further developments.

Alcohol on Trains **Brewing Up into a Major Issue**



Bans on alcohol on trains is brewing up into a major issue for those who rely on the train for public transport to and from the pub as part of a responsible approach to drinking and travelling. In the Spring 2012 MersevAle we ran an article about Merseyrail's plan to introduce a total ban on alcohol on its trains. including unopened bottles and cans.

Scotrail Alcohol Ban Introduced



Since then Scotrail has introduced a ban on alcohol on all of its trains from 8pm to 10am everday. Scotrail operates virtually all rail services in Scotland including long distance services of over three hours duration to places such as Inverness, Aberdeen, Wick and Oban/Fort William.

Mereyrail Explains Its Policy on the Alcohol Ban

The Spring article led to a response from Rudi Boersma, Merseyrail's Media and Corporate Affairs Manager, outlining the company's thinking regards the ban. We print Rudi's email below:

Dear Editor

I read your magazine with interest as a fan of real ale and find it interesting and entertaining. I notice that on page 51 in the Feb-April 2012 issue you take issue with our proposed ban on the consumption of alcohol on our trains and stations which is part of our

approach to prevent anti-social behaviour on the network. Your seem to be in favour of preventing alcohol related anti-social behaviour but don't support us actually doing something about it.

Anti-social behaviour can often lead to more serious incidents and criminal behaviour and by nipping it in the bud for example by not allowing people to put their feet on the seats, we have achieved great improvements in the perception of safety and security by our passengers and staff. Our approach to anti-social behaviour is supported by our passengers, local and regional media and by our partners Merseytravel. As you say in your article "drunken and offensive behaviour on board trains is both unpleasant to existing passengers and a deterrent to potential passengers" and that's why we're doing something about it as part of our consistent approach on anti-social behaviour.

In the run up to Christmas we have, for a number of years, imposed an alcohol ban on the city centre stations and prevented people unfit to travel from boarding trains with excellent results. We are now extending this temporary alcohol ban at Christmas into a permanent feature and extending it to the entire network. This ban will be applied sensibly and would not cover unopened bottles or cans bought for later consumption or apply to people who have been "out on the town" and are having a good time. It would however cover the drinking from "open vessels" and would stop people from travelling who as a result of alcohol intoxication are a nuisance to others and a danger to themselves to the benefit of the vast majority of passengers who find such behaviour unpleasant and intimidating.

Merseyrail has been running a station poster campaign with this title for some months. It states that staff have the right to refuse passengers the right to travel.

Since the New Year MerseyAle has received a number of comments and complaints regards passengers being refused the right to travel by Merseyrail barrier staff on the grounds of having had too much to drink. The claim made by these passengers is that Merseyrail staff have been making arbitrary judgements as to whether people are to be allowed to travel. The complaints have come from women as well as men, and in several cases have collaborated by travelling companions who have queried the decision of the staff on the grounds that the passenger was not in such a condition as to be a risk to themselves, to other passengers, or

This refusal to travel can have serious consequences with people left stranded at stations late at night without means of onward travel, a matter of particular concern when women are involved. In no instance did staff enquire as to how the person was to get home.

MerseyAle emailed Rudi on 20th July inviting him to outline the guidelines and instructions given to staff regards refusing the right to travel. So far we have not received a reply. When we do we will print it so that passengers are aware of the criterion being used to refuse travel.



After a year of local tasting panels and regional heats leading up to the finals, CAMRA is proud to announce that Coniston brewery's 'No.9 Barley Wine' has been crowned the 'Best Beer' in Britain



at the Great British Beer Festival, Olympia, London.

No.9 Barley Wine, which has an ABV of 8.5% was described by the judges as 'having fantastic finesse, reminiscent of a fine cognac.'

The Coniston brewed real ale was judged the Supreme Champion over a host of other finalists in 7 different beer categories (Bitters, Best Bitters, Strong Bitters, Golden Ales, Milds, Winter Beers, and the Speciality class), including beers from both small microbrewers and large regional brewers.

Roger Protz, of the Final judging panel, spoke in praise of the winner. He said:








Young people 'not visiting pubs' say CAMRA

The number of young people drinking in pubs has fallen sharply over the past few years, according to new research.

A study of the drinking habits of 18 to 24-yearolds by CAMRA shows the number visiting pubs at least once a week has fallen from 38% to 16% in the past seven years.

During that time more than 8,000 pubs closed across the UK with campaigners blaming higher taxes on beer.

CAMRA spoke to 1,000 adults including 150 18 to 24-year-olds in its survey. Despite the falling numbers of young people going to pubs, more were trying real ale, especially young women.

Mike Benner, CAMRA's chief executive, said:
"Hard working publicans have been
hammered by the government in recent



times. What we've seen in the past seven years is that young adults in particular have been priced out of an affordable night down their local pub."





Third place went to the **Rhymney Brewery of Blaenavon with their Hobby Horse bitter**.



Once again from the Isle of Man it is a pleasure to report not only more gains for real ale, but also an increase in the number of beer festivals held this summer, further investment by Heron & Brearley into its pub estate, progress on a new microbrewery the fourth brewery on an Island of 80,000 people, hopeful news on the pub re-opening front, as well as two new real ale Island publications.

Sidings is Isle of Man Pub of the Year 2012.



As reported briefly in the Spring issue of Mersey Ale, after many years the Sidings in Castletown, sited beside the steam railway station, has won The Isle of Man Pub of the Year award. It now progresses into the North West of England regional round of the

competition.

New landlord Dave Sayle and his team have made considerable improvements in the last year to this already stalwart real ale pub, the last remaining real ale free house in Castletown. In particular within this essentially three roomed pub, there has been much needed decoration and refurbishment of the overspill room to the right of the bar, used for dining, meetings, and for hosting bands.

The walls feature historic photographs of the steam railway, with the names of all the IMR stations on nameplates above the bar. The tables for dining are well presented in an informal manner with fresh flowers on each table. The result is a more homely feel than in previous times which will appeal to a broader clientele. Very

competitively priced food is served, with main courses on offer at as little as £5.00, served seven days a week at lunchtimes. In addition there are major plans to refurbish the kitchen area in the coming months, and once completed to offer food throughout the day. Also it is intended to

increase the size of the pool room to the left of the bar, making for a more comprehensive sports bar/games room.

In a tough high beer taxation market, these are just the kind of improvements needed when looking to the future, and the pub is certain to attract a broader clientele, especially with the extensive beer garden to the rear of the property but vitally without detriment to the real ale or atmosphere.

Real Ale is Still the Main Siding Story!

The central bar area remains largely unchanged with its vast array of

hand pumps along the straight bar area. The pub design is such that there is no danger of the real ale



drinker feeling pushed out by the increasing food offering. Continuity has been the key here during the new tenureas with all bastions of real ale pubs, recognising it takes

considerable time to build a

reputation.

Four local real ales are ever present, with heavy emphasis on the Bushys range, including **Bushy Bitter**, **Bushys Ruby Mild**, and **Bushys Castletown Bitter**. **Okells Bitter** is also always present.

For the remaining guests an unusual beer policy is in place. Instead of a never ending series of random microbrewery offerings, never to be seen again, (irritating to some but not others), every fourth order in turn the pub returns to four regularly featured guests, namely, Bombadier, Everards Tiger, Copper **Dragon Best Bitter and Green King IPA.** In the intervening order periods, various styles and strengths are selected as guests, thereby maintaining plenty of variety. Importantly the bar staff are invariably willing to chat about and advise on the ales.

All in all a textbook and well managed change of tenure at what was already a mainstay on Island cask ale outlet.

PUB IS THE HUB - USE IT OR LOSE IT -COMMUNITY FOCUS.

Whilst the fortune of real ale itself is flourishing, in the U.K. many suburban pubs or venues in small catchment areas are struggling to survive. The Isle of Man has remained to date largely unscathed in this regard. However, aside from the well known specialist real ale pubs, there are a large number of community pubs, both free houses and managed that continue to provide both real ale and an excellent community amenity serving their local populations. It is worth a moment focusing on the variety of such pubs across Island, and the broad range of support given to the local community.

The Haven Port Erin

Now back with the long awaited pub sign, the Haven has long been a locals pub, away from the main tourist areas of the town. Whilst the front room is often lively at



weekends, the back room is often packed at other times and offers pool, darts. Along with Okells Bitter and an occasional guest, there is a large TV screen for the sport. The pub often hosts members of the



Rushen Football club, and takes an active part in The Southern darts and pool leagues, as well as hosting regular quiz nights. Participation in these leagues by large numbers of pubs is a key part of community life and maintains the momentum of trade mid week.

Tynwald Inn St Johns



Again, stocking usually Okells bitter and a guest ale the Tynwald is now the only pub remaining in St Johns. Home cooked food is available throughout the day Monday to Saturday, along with Sunday serving between noon and 4pm. The pub, which can be open as late as 1.00am weekends, is child friendly during the day. Once more, in addition to darts and pool teams, the pub hosts a large number of local groups for regular meetings, including The Southern motocross group, Heavy Horse Society, Staffordshire bull terriers club, and metal detectors organisation-along with T.T. marshals from time to time. The pub often allows local bands use of rooms for practising free of charge, providing a superbly well used local amenity as well as the cask ale on offer. For T.T. fans , a large range of motorbike photos adorn the walls above the bar area, along with a photograph of T.T. legend Joey Dunlop visiting The Tynwald Inn.

Cat With No Tail on Governors Hill Douglas

This Heron & Brearley managed



house serves a large housing estate to the north west of Douglas. It now stocks two guest ales regularly in addition to Okells bitter. It has extensive dining areas in addition to a large open plan area for games/viewing sport on T.V. The sports room features many photographs of the landlord's favourite club West Bromwich Albion, a refreshingly non corporate approach for a managed



house. As well as Bridge mornings and Whist drives, the pub somewhat unusually hosts church services on Sunday mornings. A large cheque above the door for £1700 indicates monies raised for the Manx Stroke Foundation. Here again, not just a pub, but a genuine local amenity and meeting point.

These are three examples of pubs providing an excellent service to the community, whilst also stocking well kept real ale.

Two New Real Ale Publications on Island

Rail Ale Isle of Man - Free Booklet In what we think is a unique Island cooperation and partnership, Isle of Man Railways have produced a

nineteen pub

The concept is based on the MerseyAle "ManxRAle" supplement published in the Spring 2010 edition for the CAMRA National Members Weekend and AGM held in Douglas. Both major breweries, Okells and Bushys sponsored the



booklet, and along with CAMRA Isle of Man provided material in a joint exercise to promote both the railways, and local pubs and amenities.

IOM CAMRA contributed significantly by providing the research and some of the labour and legwork, coordinating the pubs featured, along with distributing the booklets to pubs, thus keeping production costs to a minimum in these difficult times. The leaflet has been highlighted by a number of publications, not least by

London Drinker magazine, who enthusiastically praised the Isle of Man for having a proactive government prepared to do something to help promote its pub industry! A sign of frustration I fear by Londoners, seeing their pubs taking a hammering in times of high beer taxation, and difficult trading conditions.

IOM Pub Walks Book

In addition this summer Ann Reeder, a real ale fan and long time visitor to The



Isle of Man, has written 'Heritage Pub Walks in The Isle of Man' published by Author house. Ten walks are featured of varying length, along

with maps, notes for tourists and of course essential cask ale pub stopping points along the way. The publication provides an excellent and well researched introduction to the Island, whilst for those on Island it is obvious immediately that Ann certainly knows her real ale pubs.

Beer Festivals Thrive The Sulby Glen Beer Festival



Now in its eighth year the festival took place in July. Once again an excellent festival held by landlady Rosie Christian, who has now completed 25 years service at The Sulby Glen Hotel – see the pub banner!. Rosie held what was believed to be the first Isle of Man Beer festival back in July 1993. As well as the twenty plus real ales,

Manx cheeses and produce were also available. Beer of the Festival was St .Austell's Proper Job.

Two New Beer Festivals Both Successful First Ventures

The Castle (Gluepot) Castletown




Better known as The Gluepot this H&B pub held a fifteen beer festival over ʻtin bath world championships' weekend from Thursday 5th July to Sunday 8th July. To the uninitiated particularly in the U.K. this believe it or not is an international event racing tin baths in Castletown Harbour. Davy Jones' locker unsurprisingly features quite prominently during the course of the event! (Think planes off Brighton Pier). Anyway, all good harmless fun, now enhanced by what is hoped to become an annual beer festival in this iconic pub setting alongside the harbour and the castle. Interestingly H&B decided to market the event by producing a tasting guide with all the beers in ascending strength order, which proved particularly useful.

Vagabonds Beer Festival

Vagabonds, an Isle of Man mainstay Rugby Union Club in outer Douglas close to Nobles Hospital, held its





first beer festival in July featuring 20 guest ales. Proceeds went to develop club funds. With live jazz music, and described as 'the first festival of many' all went well. The festival was opened by non other than Geoff Corkish, Douglas West M.H.K. Mr Corkish, is his former days with the Steam Packet before election to the House of Keys, has offered huge support to real ale not least a few years ago when he arranged for MerseyAle to be brought over to the Island for the first time, via his Steam Packet connections, for which we remain indebted.

The British Refurbished

The Heron and Brearley refurbishments continue apace, with The British on the Quay, Douglas having undergone a full refurbishment. The pub is now a



single roomed open plan venue with wooden flooring and a mixture of tables, bar stools, and sofa style seating. A surfeit of scatter cushions can make it difficult to sit down. Merseyside fans there was a Fab Four cushion but it seems to have disappeared! Iconic photographs of British stars of film and stage such as Hitchcock and a young Oliver Reed adorn the walls, along with a portrait of a young Queen Elizabeth. There is a London look with a section of the Central line tube map painted on the walls and large station type clocks on the walls.

Food is served lunchtimes and evenings. A small outdoor seating area has comfortable chairs. Interestingly, by the time MerseyAle goes to print, a first floor

"British Embassy" venue will be opened, capable of catering for 80 diners in a room that can be split into three sections when required. Functions and meetings will be accommodated, and the views over the inner harbour should be spectacular. There will be a bar on the first floor to cater for these functions.

Real ale wise, there is a massive increase in the offering with eight hand pumps in two banks of four. Currently one bank is reserved for Okells ales, with guests on the other. Commendable commitment here, although it remains to be seen whether there is sufficient demand to sustain such a large number of ales in good condition over winter months. However as with many seaside locations, there is no shame in reducing the number of ales on sale during quieter months.

Once again Heron and Brearley have succeeded with another well thought out refurbishment.

Doghouse Brewery

The new Doghouse Brewery in Jurby was set to make its first commercial brew week of 13th August. Note the brewer advises that the Doghouse brewery in U.K. listed on the w.w.web is now defunct after a name change and has no relation to the Jurby venture.

The Central in Peel and the Bay View Port St Mary

Reopened some months ago the Central continues to thrive. Rumours persist that the now



closed Bay View Hotel on the front at Port St Mary may reopen soon.

The Stanley Ramsey

In the North long standing landlord of The Stanley, Ramsey, Colin



Clarke has retired after a fantastic stint of 24 and a half years. New landlord Martin Timoney is busy redecorating the pub and is retaining real ale. He will be supporting the football, Gaelic football, as well as returning the pub to the mens and ladies darts league.

The Northern Bar and Grill Ramsey is now Bar Logo

It has returned to its former name of Bar Logo, and is undecided as to whether to continue with real ale.

Two New Real Ale Venues


The Heron, in Anagh Cooar in outer Douglas, has for some time stocked two or three real ales. A further MerseyAle feature will appear in a future edition.

In St Johns, Greens licensed café



opposite the Tynwald Inn is stocking Bushys bitter. Now there are those who sometimes have to do their duty and take the relatives out for tea and scones, when the pub would otherwise beckon. They could do far worse than to accidentally on purpose chance upon the excellent Greens and discover by surprise the ale inside. For once don't just attribute this finding to MerseyAle!

Massive push to get past 100,000 signature target



CAMRA E-Petition update-sign today

Massive push to get past 100,000 signature target

A HUGE effort to promote the duty escalator petition throughout August has seen the Campaign close to the 100,000 target required to secure a parliamentary debate.

It makes the duty e-petition the third most signed petition on the government website and the most popular petition which has yet to achieve the 100,000 target.

The e-petition aims to force the chancellor to stop the duty escalator which sees around five percent automatically added to the cost of a pint every year – harming the pub trade.

A further 5,000 signatures collected at the Great British Beer Festival were being entered onto the epetition as What's Brewing went to press – but it looked likely the petition total would top *85,000 by the end of the month, just 15,000 shy of the total.

But CAMRA's campaign team is not complacent and knows that the remaining signatures will prove as hard to get as the first 85,000.

Campaigns manager Emily Ryans said: "We've got the easy signatures and talked to the easy-to-contact members. The last 15,000 names are going to be the hardest to secure."

The team plans to continue to campaign at beer festivals in September.

In addition brewery liason officers are being encouraged to get Their breweries involved in the campaign – signing up staff and promoting the e-petition to their customers.

To date 5,500 point-of-sales kits have been sent to pubs to promote the e-petition and petition forms have been inserted into pub newspaper *The Publican's Morning Advertiser and BEER and What's Brewing*.

Campaigns officer Clair Cain said there was still promotional stock available. She added: "I'd also like to remind everyone to return their petition insert, if they haven't done so already. Make sure you've put your email on it please! If you've lost it, you can download it from the CAMRA website."

Despite the poor weather this summer a friend and I decided to hit the rails and head off to Lancaster. It was many years since I last visited this very pleasant town and only had vague memories of the pub scene.

After a good rail journey we set off to find the 'George and Dragon' on St. George's Quay, an area of renovated 18th century warehouses, overlooking the River Lune. It is a small narrow terraced pub, with a beer garden at the rear.



After speaking with the landlady we discovered there was a path from the beer garden to the railway station; must remember for next time. The landlady apologised for only having two beers on, **Deuchars** and **Summer Lightning** as the night before had been rather busy. I for one will not complain about having to have a pint of Summer Lightning!

While having our beer we read an article in the local Lunesdale Drinker about a visit to Crosby and Waterloo*, quite weird!! Both beers were in fine form and we soon got chatting to the landlady with her four legged companion 'George.' As she said if he's George I must be the Dragon!! After a number of



years in the business she only took over here a few weeks ago and is getting things as she wants them. At present meals are not available but are on the things to do list. A very pleasant start to our afternoon.

Our next pub was the 'Three Mariners' about 5 minutes' walk from the 'George and Dragon' by the Millennium Bridge. This is said



to be the oldest pub in Lancaster and is partly built into the side of Castle Hill. The bar area is quite compact with plenty of wood and

leather. They had 4 beers available, Coniston Bluebird, Cross Bay Sunset, Butcombe Bitter and York Guzzler. All the beers were good and reasonably priced. There is a larger room to the right of the bar which looked as though it was mainly used for meals. Unusually the have a gravity fed cellar and the beer arrives from the floor above (like the 'Hole in the Wall' used to be!'). There is a small area outside to sit, in fact it is the site of the old

From here we headed up into the town to find 'The Sun' in Church



Street. A very different style of pub to the other two, but then again it is also a very successful hotel and dining venue. Records of the building date back to the 17th century when it also provided accommodation. The modernised and minimalist bar has kept some



of the original features including a very large 300 year old oak door, a fireplace and some very nice stonework. They had 10 hand **pumps** of which 9 were available. There were 6 Lancaster Brewery beers on (the place is owned by the company who own Lancaster Brewery), DBC Jurassic, Thwaites

Wainwright and Slater's Supreme. There were about 7 foreign beers on the fonts. These included a Paulaner Wheat Beer and Timmermans Framboise. The prices are higher than other pubs. over £3 a pint and Timmermans was on the menu at £5.20 a pint! The food menu is extensive and covers all bases from a coffee to a full blow out, and includes breakfast. They have opened up a beer garden to the rear of the building and have recently staged a 4 day beer festival. I only wish they

The bar manager was very knowledgeable and happy to chat about the beers and was able to give some suggestions on what we might like. The inside



of the pub is quite spacious and food is available.

Both the 'Water Witch' and the 'White Cross' offer discounts to CAMRA members on production of a valid membership card.

Time was moving on and as the train waits for no man we headed for the station. We would have liked to have stayed longer and to have tried a number of other inviting pubs such as 'Yorkshire House', 'John O'Gaunt' (famous for its blues and jazz memorabilia and live music, its homemade Cullen Skink and for its misspelt brass Britannia class engine nameplate above the bar). 'The Penny Bank', 'Ring O'Bells' and Merchants 1688 to mention just a few. So we now have plenty of good reasons to revisit Lancaster sometime soon.

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
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THE AUGUSTUS JOHN WINS THE DOUBLE



The month of May this year presented Liverpool pub the Augustus John with two reasons to celebrate.

The pub was awarded the Liverpool Cider Pub of the Year 2012, and also the Regional Cider Pub of the Year 2012 for the Merseyside & Cheshire region. Both achievements are testimony to the hard work that manager Tony O'Donnell and his team have put in at Peach Street pub over recent years.

No Liverpool pub has ever won the CAMRA Regional Cider award before with the award usually being passed around a worthy circuit of Cheshire pubs. This year the 'AJ' came top beating the Harkers Arms in Chester, the Albion in Warrington and the Brass Balance in Birkenhead. Three regional branch judges awarded the 'AJ' top place based on cider range, quality and value for money (£2.75 per pint).

Five Real Ciders at AJ

The pub always has at least five real ciders on sale, and incredibly from June this year, has had nine on sale at any one time. Many of the ciders like Cornish Orchards are rare in the

Merseyside area. The 'A)' sits at the edge of the university campus and has recognised that real cider served well represents another revenue stream, that awards mean new customers plus publicity on the web and in local publications. The pub now advances in to the last sixteen of the national competition, the winner being announced in October.

Real Cider Grows in Popularity

The popularity of real cider across the country has grown considerably over the last five years A few years ago the cider drinker had to know which was the specialist pub where cider was sold. These days many real ale pubs will stock at least one tub or bag-in-box of real cider or perry, as managers recognise the appeal to a broad range of drinkers regardless age or gender. It's very likely that more pubs will be submitted for the Regional award in 2013. St Helens for example now has several pubs stocking real cider and Wirral too has seen a growth in the availability of real

cider. This is great news for us cider drinkers and for the pubs.

Cider Tasting Event Liverpool Real Ale Festival 2012

To celebrate October being cider month Liverpool CAMRA have organised a cider tasting upstairs at the Crown Hotel, Lime Street.

The tasting will be led by Cheshire cidermaker Mathew Veasey who is the proprietor of the Nooks Yard orchard at Northwich. Mathew is originally from Somerset and brings a great deal of cider making knowledge to the northwest. We will hear how ciders are a blend of different apples and we will each get the chance to blend a cider to our own taste.

There are only thirty places and the event is FREE but places must be booked via email.

BEER SCORING AND GBG ENTRY

Have you ever thought about how pubs get into the Good Beer Guide (GBG)? Unlike those guides where paid individuals submit reviews, GBG entries are compiled from beer scores submitted by Branch members. Every Branch member has the opportunity to contribute to the GBG.

CAMRA may sometimes appear to be a rather distant organization with our use of abbreviations and acronyms. However, one of the more enjoyable benefits of membership is to know that your opinion counts when it comes to producing the GBG, the Campaign's flagship publication. Yet, some people do find beer scoring confusing and are unsure as to the 'correct way' to record a beer score. But don't despair, as help is at hand. You don't need to be particularly knowledgeable about every beer you might come across. You just need to find one that you like and give an opinion about its quality; that is, how well it's been looked after since it left the brewery.

So what's the secret? We all have our favourite styles. If one beer isn't to your taste, put it down to experience, find one you've tried before and see if that one cuts the mustard. Give it a score. Maybe have another one if it's that good and record that one too. Gradually, as you walk around the pubs, you will accumulate scores and you will begin to develop your own method of making comparisons. It's like riding a bike. Soon it becomes second nature. You may even become a ticker!

Liverpool and District CAMRA desperately needs more beer scorers from within the Branch. The Branch particularly needs volunteers in the suburbs where there are doubtless many deserving pubs worthy of GBG consideration. We know there are many regulars in these pubs who aren't submitting

scores. Remember, if you want your favourite pub to be included in the GBG, you need to record your impressions of the beers you're drinking – if you don't, the pub won't be in the Guide. It's that simple!

CAMRA has 5 and 10-point scoring system (half points can be used in a 0 to 5 system) and a basic guide to scoring can be found at

http://www.camra.org. uk/page.aspx?o=180520 where you can also find a supply of scoring cards. The easiest way to submit scores is via the National Beer Scoring System: http://www. beerscoring.org.uk/. To login, you will need your CAMRA membership number and your CAMRA password, the site then allows you to enter vour scores and enables vou to keep a record of everything your drink, which you can also download as an Excel document. If you do use this system, please try to pick pubs from the drop-down lists. This prevents the system retaining several different versions of the same pub (i.e." Hole in Ye Wall", "Hole in the Wall", "The Hole in the Wall").

The advantage of using the NBBS system is that you can score pubs all over the country not just in our branch and make a contribution to the GBG on a national level. You can email your scores to me at surveys@ merseycamra.org.uk. or submit them on a sheet of paper like the one we'll hand out at Branch get-togethers. The CAMRA website also has beer scoring cards which you can print off and hand back to me, or any member of the Committee. Please use the method with which vou feel most comfortable.


All of the scores recorded for our local pubs are collated and those pubs with the highest average beer scores and with the largest number of surveyors contributing to those scores go forward to the Regional Director with a recommendation they be included in the Guide. This is all decided at one or more meetings hosted by the GBG coordinator and we will publish more information about how this is arranged in a future edition of MerseyAle.

If you would like to try your hand a beer scoring why not join one of our 'taster' survey trips. Part of the Liverpool Pubs Festival, the trips take place on 25th September in Lark Lane and 30th October in Waterloo. There will be no pressure to score every pint, and fellow CAMRA members will be on hand to provide guidance to first timers.
