Other drinks will be available too. Food trader Noble's Kitchen will be on site cooking Bratwurst sausages and other dishes.

17-19th October find them at Rainhill Rotary Festival where they'll have cask beers pouring and a stand alone bar will be on site dispensing 4 keg beers which is a first for them. (As you know their beer is naturally conditioned in all its relevant vessels).

CAMRA's priorities for the new Labour Government

As the Labour party conference hits Liverpool this September, CAMRA are giving conference delegates and attendees a run-down on the key issues facing consumers, pubs and breweries across the UK.

CAMRA is a consumer group with around 150,000 members across the UK and acts as an independent voice for real ale drinkers and pub goers. Our vision is to have quality real ale and thriving pubs in every community.



We would like to see the Labour Government take action on:

Fair Tax

Cutting duty specifically on beer and cider served in pubs.

Business Rates

Making the system in England fairer for pubs.

Planning Protections

Stop pubs being lost to unfair or unwanted demolition or conversion.

Consumer Rights

Guarantee clear information on ingredients, price, dispense – and the right in law to a full pint.

Access to Market for independent producers

Improving choice of beer and cider for consumers.

Looking ahead to the Budget

Ahead of the Chancellor's first Budget on 30th October, we set out what pubgoers, licensees and independent breweries and cider makers want to see from Rachel Reeves.

Cutting tax on pints in pubs

Pubs are at the heart of communities up and down the country and are a key part of our social fabric, helping to tackle loneliness and social isolation.

To recognise and encourage the social benefits of consuming beer, cider and perry in the regulated setting of licenced premises the Chancellor should extend the discount on tax charged on beer and cider served in pubs and social clubs.

What is the draught duty rate?

The draught duty rate is a different level of duty specifically for draught beer and cider. At the moment, there is a 10% discount on beer and cider duty for draught products served in pubs, social clubs and brewery taprooms.

This helps them compete with the likes of supermarket alcohol.

Why should the draught duty rate be made more generous?

Extending the discount on tax on pints served in pubs from 10% to 20% would target support at consumers, pubs and independent breweries that sell most of their products to pubs.

This would also be more affordable than an across-the-board alcohol duty freeze, as any reduction in the duty charged on draught beer and cider will not benefit supermarkets and off-licences, recognising the social, environmental and economic benefits of encouraging consumption in our pubs and social clubs.

Beer Festival Volunteers Thank You Trip

One of the perks of working as a volunteer at the beer festival is a free coach trip. If the brewery that wins the beer of the festival is located within driving distance we usually go there and present them with their award. This year's beer of the festival was won by **George Samuel Brewery** with their **Chocolate Honeycomb Stout**.



As the brewery is in the North East and too far to drive to, we passed their certificate to their Brewery Liaison Officer, who organised a presentation.

We then asked our committee if they could come up with an alternative destination for the trip and it was **Steve Downing** who suggested a trip to Skipton and the **Skipton Beer Festival**, organised by the local CAMRA branch.

The trip proved popular and with a full coach we set off from Liverpool on what, was, a sunny morning, unfortunately the weather deteriorated as the day went on. After an event free drive we arrived in Skipton, the beer festival was in Skipton Town Hall a great venue and a few minutes' walk from the coach car park.

The local CAMRA branch had kindly provided us with a list of recommended pubs, some coach trippers ventured to these first, so that they could enjoy the canal side pubs whilst the sun was still shining. Others went into the beer festival, where the beer choice was considerably smaller than at our festival, but there were lots of beers that you do not see in Liverpool. Plenty of style choice too.

After a few hours spent at the festival, there were some pubs that were a must to visit, although the weather was starting to turn so outside drinking was not an option. We headed to the **Narrow Boat pub** close to the canal, where the beer was good as was the food, my



husband said the chips were the best he had ever had. The pub itself has just been refurbished but has kept the characteristics of a traditional English pub.

From the Narrow Boat we worked our way back to the coach park, stopping off firstly at the **Swadford Tap**, despite having large screens showing football, the pub was not too busy. They only have four hand pulls but the beer was of good quality.

Time was running out but we managed to fit one more pub in, the **Speakeasy**, a cosy, welcoming space that despite its small size is a venue for live music. They have three hand pulls dispensing beer from the local **LAMB brewery** from Littondale.

There are plenty more good real ale pubs in Skipton which were visited by other members of our party, the feedback was positive, a great day was had by all.

We headed back to the coach, tired but happy, there was even a fish and chip shop less than a minute from were the coach was parked, which some people took advantage of. After all that beer an ideal way to finish the day.

If you would like to join us on our next volunteer thank you trip, volunteer forms for next year's festival will be up on our website from the middle of September. You do not need to be a CAMRA member or have any experience to volunteer at our beer festival.

How CAMRA can help Parliamentarians, councillors and political activists

CAMRA's Campaigns and Communications Team are here to help elected representatives and campaigners work for a fair deal for consumers, pubs, social clubs, breweries and cider makers.



CAMRA can help with:

- Statistics about pub closures and openings in your area.
- Briefings on key local, national and regional campaigns and issues facing the beer and pubs sector.
- Resources and guides on things like saving your local pub, tackling loneliness or promoting local beer and cider.
- Parliamentary activity help with drafting Parliamentary questions, early day motions, amendments to legislation etc.
- Cross Party Groups: CAMRA help run the Westminster All-Party Parliamentary Pubs Group, the Scottish Parliament's Cross Party Group on Beer and Pubs and the Senedd's Cross Party Group on Beer and Pubs.
- Council work for example, providing best practice on planning policy for local authorities to help protect community pubs.

Protecting our pubs

Our locals are at the heart of community life up and down the country. When they are under threat, we need planning laws to offer pubs protection – as well as giving communities the right to take over their local as a community pub.

Protecting pubs in England

CAMRA welcomes the Labour Government's plan to give communities a right to buy community assets under threat of being sold, converted or demolished – including pubs.

However, we also need planning laws to be strengthened to stop pubs being lost to illegal conversion or demolition, against the wishes of local people. In the past year, 29 pubs were demolished or converted without apparent planning permission.

- The Government should ensure that local authorities have the resources and enforcement powers needed to stop pubs being lost to unfair or unwanted demolition or conversion without serious and consistent consequences for developers - including the power to order pubs to be rebuilt brick by brick if necessary.
- Plans for rolling out High Street Rental Auction schemes should exclude pubs so they aren't lost to communities by being converted into other uses.
- Planning law and planning policy should require all new large-scale developments to contain at least one pub.
- The Government should introduction a definition of a pub for planning purposes.

Protecting our pubs

Protecting pubs in Scotland

In Scotland, you don't need planning permission to demolish a freestanding pub.

CAMRA wants MSPs to close this loophole by changing permitted development rights so that planning permission is always required to demolish a pub. This would give communities a say over the decision, and a chance to campaign to save their pub or take over the running of it as a community pub.

Protecting pubs in Wales

In Wales, there are no protections in planning law for pubs.

The Welsh Government should use its upcoming legislation on planning to introduce protections for Welsh pubs for the first time. Making sure planning permission is needed before a pub is converted into another use or demolished entirely would give the community a chance to object to the loss of their local.

Big brewers are misleading consumers - help us stop the Handpump Hijack!

Cask beer is a uniquely British product that can only be enjoyed in your local pub, social club or taprooms – but it is under threat!

For generations, a handpump on the bar has been a sign of cask conditioned beer. Now, Carlsberg Marston's Brewing Company - one of the world's largest brewery conglomerates - has resorted to misleading consumers by hijacking the handpump to serve its "Fresh Ale" product.



What is Fresh Ale?

'Fresh Ale' is a range of beers that have been filtered and put into sealed barrels or kegs.

These are then served to consumers via handpumps on the bar, in a way that is virtually indistinguishable from the dispense method for cask-conditioned beer.

These are not the same as traditional cask-conditioned beer, which doesn't leave the brewery as a finished product. Instead, the conditioning that completes the brewing process for cask beer is done at the pub, and relies on the skills, timing and experience of the staff and licensee.

Why should handpumps be protected for cask beer?

CAMRA believes there is room in the market for all types of beer – but 'Fresh Ale' shouldn't be served through handpumps at the bar as it is misleading for consumers – making them believe that they are getting cask-conditioned beer when they are not.

What can the Government do about it?

As a traditional product synonymous with British brewing and pubs, we believe it is imperative that cask conditioned beer served through traditional handpumps at the bar is protected.

That way, consumers know that when they are choosing a beer from a handpump they will be getting a quality, caskconditioned beer.

The Government should work with National Trading Standards and Trading Standards Scotland to stop the misleading use of cask handpumps in a way that is confusing to customers.

What can Conference goers do to help?

- Visit https://camra.org.uk/hijack to find out more.
- Ask ministers in the Department for Business and Trade to work with National Trading Standards and Trading Standards Scotland to protect consumers from products which unfairly imitate or present themselves as caskconditioned beer,
- Ask your local council's trading standards department if they will take steps to stop misleading dispense of kegged beer through traditional handpumps at pubs in their area.
- Urge Parliamentarians to support protecting the traditional British handpump for cask ale and its real cider equivalents so consumers aren't misled at the bar.

Improving consumer rights

CAMRA wants to see the Government introduce some changes to consumer rights laws to make sure beer drinkers and pubgoers have better rights and access to information about what they're buying.



- Beer labelling: Consumers should have a right to know about ingredients and whether a beer is intended to be cloudy or hazy; and who has made the product and where – to stop misleading marketing of beers by global brands pretending to come from small, independent producers.
- Stop misleading practices: We want to see an end to the sale of beers under different trade names, present global brewers' beers as if they come from independent breweries.
- The right to a full pint: A pint of beer should be legally defined as 100% liquid to ensure that consumers are not short-changed at the bar.
- Price lists at the bar: The Government should bring back the requirement for a clearly displayed price list.
- Access to local beer and cider: The Government should look at improving access to market for small and independent breweries to improve choice for consumers, particularly in the tied-pubs sector.



Save Our Inn Signs

Founded in 1990, the Inn Sign Society raises awareness of the nation's pub signs and compiles a record for the benefit of future

generations. Many pub names have links with events from the past or personalities of national and local importance, and the Society provides a forum for members to research the history of inns and pub names.

It has an active web site and a quarterly full-colour journal to which members are encouraged to submit articles, pictures of pub signs and news from their areas.

As inns and pubs close at an alarming rate, much local heritage is in danger of being lost forever. Pubs are not just a place to enjoy a drink, they are often at the heart of the community and can reflect its history.

Many members take a general interest in all signs, with some specialising in particular breweries, counties, aircraft or railways, to name but a few.

The local Midlands Group meets three or four times a year at the **Mare & Colt**, near Kidderminster, to enjoy a lunch followed by a slideshow of pub signs.

The Inn Sign Society is seeking to recruit more members and bring in new blood to

help continue the good work done over the last 32 years.

Making the Business Rates system fairer [England only]

Pubs currently pay 2.8% of the entire business rates bill but only account for 0.5% of total business turnover.

This is an overpayment of around £500 million by the beer and pubs sector each year. This unfair overpayment by the pub sector needs to end permanently.

CAMRA warmly welcomed the Labour manifesto commitment to change the outdated business rates system in England to make it fairer between online and bricks-and-mortar businesses like pubs.

The Chancellor should use the Budget to guarantee that under a new business rates system, pubs will no longer pay an unfair share of business rates.

Before a new, fairer business rates system can be introduced, the Chancellor should commit to keeping the current 75% discount on business rates for hospitality businesses. This is vital in keeping beer and pub businesses afloat during tough economic times.

CAMRA Champion Beer of Britain Competition



Voting in CAMRA's Champion Beer of Britain competition for 2026 will open on Thursday 12 September and will close on 4 November. All current CAMRA members are encouraged to vote. It is your chance to have a say in this competition. If you have not voted before, there is a voting guide available on the main CAMRA website. Once the votes are counted and the nominations

from local tasting panels are taken into account, the winning beers will go through to a series of regional heats that will be held across the country. All judging is carried out on a 'blind tasting' basis. It is hoped that the final judging and the announcement of the winners will take place at the **2026 Great British Beer Festival**.

You can vote for up to five beers across each of the following 12 categories:

- Milds: up to and including 4% ABV
- Session bitters: up to and including 4.3% ABV
- Premium bitters: 4.4% to 6.4% ABV
- Session pale, blond and golden ales: up to and including 4.3% ABV
- Premium pale, blond and golden ales: 4.4% to 6.4% ABV
- British and New World IPAs: 5.5% ABV and above
- Brown and red ales, old ales and strong milds: up to 6.4% ABV

- Session stouts and porters: up to and including 4.9% ABV
- Strong stouts and porters, including imperial stouts and
- Baltic porters: 5.0% ABV and above
- Barley wines and strong ales: 6.5%
 ABV and above
- Speciality beers: differently produced
- Speciality beers: flavoured



The Vines (aka "The Big House") sits on the corner of Lime Street and Copperas Hill, next to the famous Adelphi hotel. It was built in 1907 by the famous Liverpool



name. It was designed for Robert by the famous Liverpool architect Walter Thomas who had designed the Philharmonic Dining Rooms for him over seven years earlier.

After years of neglect this Grade II* listed pub was reopened in early 2023 by the "1936 Pub Group" and was promptly





awarded "Best Refurbishment" by the committee of the local branch of CAMRA. The Vines has now been recognised by CAMRA nationally, winning the "Historic England Conservation" category at the Pub Design Awards. These awards recognise the highest standards of architec-

ture in the refurbishment and historic conservation of pubs across the UK. In the case of the Vines the judges were impressed by "the high quality of the restoration of this iconic Grade II* listed Edwardian pub that had reversed years of poor care under the previous management".



The award was presented at the ceremony held in the Vines on 19th June 2024 and Liverpool & Districts branch of CAMRA would like to extend our congratulations to everyone at The Big House for an award that is well deserved.










Gerard Madden - Bar Person of the Year



Gerard retired from the Bridewell pub in early July this year, having served there since it re-opened 5 years ago. He was the 'waiter who brought a tray', serving drinks direct to people's tables in his charming and courte-ous manner, never forgetting an order and taking an interest in everyone he served, whether regulars or people new to the pub. He was a major part of the famed Dominic and Fiona team that has made that pub, and others, such a success. Prior to that, Gerard had been part of Fiona's team at Rigby's,



where he worked for 16 years, following a short period at Dr Duncans. Gerard is truly a legend amongst the real ale community of Liverpool and a very worthy recipient of the award.

But what of his earlier life? Gerard grew up in Litherland. His first venture into the hospitality industry was during the summer holidays from St Wilfrid's school when he worked for the Isle of Man Steam Packet Company. He was too young to serve alcohol but he witnessed some very lively scenes and it really was a 'baptism of fire' for a young lad!


He went to study French and English Literature at what was then Kingston Polytechnic but within six months decided academic life wasn't for him and he returned home and spent six years in the sober environments of Liverpool City Council and what was DHSS, and then Princes Foods for three and a half years. But life wasn't all sober! He became a lover of real ale and Higsons' beers in partic-


ular, and fondly recalls drinking them in Waterloo pubs and 'Lulu's' on Everton match days.

In the late 80s, desk jobs abandoned, he moved South for three years as a wine waiter, firstly in Maidenhead in Berkshire and then the Surrey stockbroker belt where his command of French came in very useful when discussing wines with patrons! He was drawn back to his home area by his love of both family and Everton Football club, the two closely intertwined. He had been to his first match at the age of 6 and his knowledge of fixtures and scores is encyclopaedic!

He spent two years as a silver service waiter in the Prince of Wales restaurant in Southport in the early 90s, then in 1994 was headhunted and became manager at the Witchwood in Ashton-under-Lyne, a live music and real ale venue, but after six months and only one day off, enough was enough. Based back in Litherland, he spent five years working at the Armadillo in Mathew Street and a short spell at the Newz Bar in Water Street, before moving to the renowned Charlie Parker restaurant in Waterloo .

And from there to Dr Duncans and the rest is history! The Bridewell was his 'Swan Song'. He says he has many happy memories and described Fiona and Dominic Hornsby as the finest employers and very good friends. They

Liverpool and Districts Pub of the Year



This year the Liverpool Branch Pub of the Year went to the Roscoe Head. The Pub of the Year selection process involves several rounds of judging, first on beer scores sent in online to whatpub.com, secondly the top 10 go to a members vote, and then



the top 5 are visited by a panel of judges. An important consideration this year was accessibility, and the judges were impressed that the Roscoe Head has a ramp available for the front steps.

The Roscoe Head is one of Liverpool's most iconic pubs. It's renowned as one of the Famous Four – pubs that have been in every edition of the CAMRA Good Beer Guide since 1974.



It was named after William Roscoe MP for Liverpool elected in 1806. He fought for the right to vote to be rolled out to a greater number of people and to abolish slavery. Fittingly, the Roscoe Head serves its local community, with licensee Carol Ross and her staff welcoming locals and visitors alike, as they enter the small bar and snug from the Roscoe Street. With two small lounges, the Roscoe shows how to divide a small pub into series of spaces making it a comfortable and welcoming place to spend time and where conversation is king.



The Roscoe is family run, Carol following on from her parents Nicky and Margaret Joyce. In 2015, the pub was taken over by New River Retail (NRR) who generally convert pubs into convenience stores

and so Carol & Liverpool CAMRA started the 'Save the Roscoe' campaign which included listing the pub as an ACV (asset of community value).

The pub owning arm of NRR were subsequently brow beaten into selling the free-hold and the Roscoe became free to buy whatever beer the customers preferred, including beers from our local breweries.

Beer quality is the main scoring factor so, it was an easy unanimous decision for the judges to name the Roscoe Head the Pub of Year.



On Wednesday 24th July Liverpool and Districts CAMRA hosted our annual awards evening, this year taking place at the Augustus John pub. This is a chance for CAMRA committee members and local licensees and brewers to come together and celebrate the branches thriving real ale scene. Pub of the Year was presented to the Roscoe Head (see article on page 24).

We started the evening with a national award presenting a Champion Beer of Britain



Award (CBOB). Champion Beer of Britain regional judging starts off at CAMRA beer festivals, with the final round at the Great British Beer Festival. Rock the Boat Brewery Sittin' on the Dock, won Gold at Stockport Beer Festival for Milds, and where presented with their certificate.



Our next award was to the Lion Tavern for their dedication to mild, the pub is committed to trying to always have one mild on.

Our MerseyAle editor Sonia James-Henry is wheelchair bound and is committed to promoting accessibility for all. Our next award was for accessibility, proving access to real ale for all, and went to the Augustus John, who not only have a ramp and an accessible toilet but also have a wide aisle which makes it easy to move round the pub.


Congratulations To All!

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The Party's over, now we have a new one



The General Election in July 2024 saw a Labour government returned. Not much has changed in terms of representation in Liverpool & Districts branch but we do have one new MP. We therefore say hello and welcome to Anneliese Midgley, MP for Knowsley, who takes over after the retirement of Sir George Howarth. Boundary changes mean that some of us may now be in new constituencies. This is true of members in the Halewood area who were in Liverpool Garston but now find themselves in Widnes and Halewood, represented by Derek Twigg MP. We share Derek Twigg with our colleagues in Halton CAMRA but we will be contacting him if any issues arise about pubs and clubs in the Halewood area.

Before the election CAMRA HQ introduced an election e-lobby so that members could contact all candidates with our concerns about protecting and promoting pubs, clubs, breweries and cider producer throughout the UK, to help them survive and thrive. The e-lobby was sent direct to all members who receive emails from CAMRA HQ. It was also posted on our social media outlets. Thank you to all of you who took the time to complete the form and lobby the candidates where you live. I hope some of you got responses. If you did, feel free to pass them to me or our branch contact so that we can remind those MPs of their pledges should the need arise. CAMRA issued its own election manifesto to candidates with a number of demands.

For the UK these were:

- Improved consumer rights on where drinks behind the bar come from and who owns the brand, overall, offering more choice for pubgoers.
- Access to the market for small and independ-

ent beer and cider makers as opposed to a market that is dominated by larger organisations.

■ The right to fairer tax by maximising the benefits of the new draught duty rate by extending the difference between tax paid on beer and cider in the pub and in off-licences and supermarkets, as well as a VAT reduction on beer and cider sold in the on-trade.

Specific asks for England only were:

- Improved planning protections and enforcement for viable and valued pubs and social clubs that face unwanted demolition or conversion without serious and consistent consequences.
- A full review of business rates to fix the unfair overpayment by the pub sector, with an emphasis that online businesses pay their fair share compared to businesses like pubs and social clubs.

The election may be over but it is vital that we as CAMRA members and branches build relationships with MPs. We need to keep reminding them about the positive contribution pubs and social clubs make to local communities, and how important brewers, cider and perry producers are to the UK's economy and culture. If you want to make a difference for pubs, pints and people we encourage you to write to your MP and raise the concerns listed above. Members can use their log-in to access the members section of the CAMRA website, where there are lots of materials to help you do this.

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
ALBERT DOCK PUB WALK

Harold Wilson once famously said that "A week is a long time in politics". Using the same analogy for beer, then it is fair to say that "A year has been a long time in the Liverpool pub setup"! Putting this into perspective, since the last Labour Party conference was held at the Albert Dock in 2023, we have seen the opening of Queen of Hope Street, The White Hart and The Engineer all by the 1936 Pub Company as well as a total revitalisation of The Vines (AKA The Big House), back to its former and imperious glory. The 1936 Pub Company has also recently opened The Monro in Duke Street which we will return to later.

This pub walk takes in 7 pubs in a circular route around the Al-



bert Dock area, and starts with **The Pump House**. This pub is instantly recognisable with its distinctive large chimney, and the pub is duly named after its Victorian purpose of providing a hydraulic power system to the area. The pub has a wide range of nooks and crannies covering a couple of floors, and sells decent



pub grub until 9pm. It is very popular with tourists so the area and can get extremely busy at weekends. On my visit there were 8 handpumps, with 5 actively selling cask ales. They have 3 regular beers, Abbott, Greene King IPA and Pump House Pale as well as at least 2 regular changing beers.

Coming out of the Pump House exit the Albert Dock and turn right down Strand Street. Walking past the old dock wall arch,



you will see the very distinctive **Baltic Fleet**, with its red funnels on the top of the building and its flat Iron frontage giving it very much the image of a mini-Titanic. The pub has 4 handpumps with **Brimstage Trappers Hat** (3.8%), being a regular beer supported by **3 changing beers**. The number of beers sold in the past can be seeing by a multitude of beer mats adorning the walls around the bar. **Please note that this is a card only pub.**

Coming out of the Baltic, turn left and keeping walking down the main road (now Wapping) away from the city, past the magnificent Wapping warehouse (Constructed in 1855). At the end of this building, which is on your right, turn left and walk up what looks like a disused road (The signage is not that clear), but persevere up it and you will come to the Black Lodge Brewery at the top right (You will see the distinctive black logo flags above the building). The Brewery has an excellent outdoor area which is a real sun trap and always has 1 cask ale on, as well as an array of craft beers. On my visit, they were selling Black Lodge Summer Ale (4.5%). The Brewery has



a chess club, meeting on the last Thursday of the month. Please note this brewery is closed on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Retrace your steps coming out of the Black Lodge and turn left at the bottom main road, turn left into Blundell Street (Past Funny Boyz) then right onto Simpson Street and you will see **Love Lane Brewery** on the right hand side. This brewery has 3 hand-pumps which all currently sell **Higsons Best Bitter** (3.8%), and of course they brew a whole array of craft beers on site. The brewery sells food and has a quiz on the final Thursday of the month. They also have regular food events and Steak nights.



They do brewery tours (By prior appointment) including **Turn-coat Gin**, the distilling of which, also takes place on the premises. Please note the Brewery is closed on Mondays.

The next walk is the longest (11 minutes to be precise), but also the most rewarding! Walk up Bridgewater Street, which leads onto Nelson Street, then turn left into Upper Pitt Street, just when you think this road has run its course, turn right into Kent Street then up to the main road at Duke Street turning left at the top. On the next block you will see **The Monro** which only opened on 8 August 2024. The Monro has been totally trans-



formed from the Gastro pub previously on site, and has been extended into the building next door, to allow a larger outdoor drinking area at the rear. The

outside of the pub has some fabulous signage including the famous old Guinness Toucan with "Time for a beer" logo, as well as a Bass Sign and many others. The pub has 15 Handpumps, of which 14 sell cask ales (With one cider). In true 1936 Pub Co style, they always have brews from **Ossett, Timothy Taylors, Titanic** and Carnival. The pub has been set out to provide the feel of a 100 year old Dublin pub and succeeds in doing this with a vast array of old bric-a-brac and an unusual room without a floor on the first floor (Well cordoned off!) which has the feel of an old Edwardian parlour. The first floor also has a smaller bar with 3 handpumps.

Coming out of the Monro, just look straight across the main road and 50 yards to the left is the **Red Lion** in Slater Street. This is another 1936 Pub Co venue which at over 2 years old now feels positively ancient against some of the newer builds! The Red Lion has 5 handpumps in-



cluding 4 cask Ales. The 2 regular beers are **Titanic Plum Porter** (4.9%) and **Ossett White Rat** (4.0%). The pub has a quiz on Sunday nights, and Irish and Gypsy Jazz music on Tuesdays and Wednesdays respectively. Leaving the Red Lion, turn back on yourself and turn right on Duke Street heading back towards town. You will walk towards old signage for the long gone Higsons Custom House Pub, which is now a mini-mart (The Higsons Double-Top sig-

nage still clearly visible on the first floor) as soon as you see this, turn left down Campbell Street and through Campbell Square and you will arrive on the right at **The Bridewell**, a 2023 winner of the **CAMRA Liverpool**



& District Pub of the Year. Historically the Bridewell was the place used to lock up various drunks and vagrants, usually prior to a meeting with the beak in the local courts the next morning! The pub has still retained its original infrastructure including the prison cells, with heavy duty doors. It is also the place where Charles Dickens once joined up as a special constable" for the day so he could safely walk around the dock area (suitably accompanied by a fellow officer of course!), to no doubt drum up some notorious characters for his next novel! The Bridewell has 4 handpumps including two regulars from the Kirkstall Brewery -Revival Series Bitter (3.8%) and Three Swords EPA (4.3%). From the Bridewell it is a straight walk down hill back to the Albert Dock.

So yes, it has been a year of significant transition on the Liverpool Beer scene, and it will be interesting to see what the next 12 months holds. As Harold Wilson himself might have said "I'll raise a glass to that", not to mention a quick smoke of his pipe as well, although no doubt he would.

Campaigning for cider and perry

While the majority of cider available at the bar comes from just a few large manufacturers, there are hundreds of independent producers throughout the UK.

In fact, around 80% of Britain's cider and perry makers are small producers.



CAMRA campaigned hard for the creation of a new progressive tax scheme for small producers that will help their businesses grow and support consumer choice at the bar - but that's only half the battle. Now we need to make sure that high quality ciders and perries, and traditional orchards are supported.

Minimum Juice Content

Most consumers won't be aware that cider has a 'minimum juice content' or the amount of juice it must contain to be taxed as cider. This is currently just 35%, meaning some of the most recognisable cider brands are more water than juice.

In a 2023 YouGov survey commissioned by CAMRA, 93% of Brits thought that the preservation of traditional orchards was important – with 87% specifically supporting raising the minimum juice content of cider to help halt the decline of orchards.

CAMRA is calling for the minimum juice content to be raised to at least 50%, and while the last Government promised a review this was never carried out. It's vital that the Labour Government hold this review so independent producers, quality cider and perry and consumer choice can be put first.


Liverpool and Districts Cider Pub of the Year

OBITUARY

David Stevenson

Dave Stevenson passed away peacefully on Wednesday 12th June aged 77, joining his loving wife Evelyn who predeceased him by barely a month.

Dave was both a pioneer and innovator in the real ale revolution that followed the formation of CAMRA in 1971.

Dave was best known for his tenure at the Ship and Mitre, Dale Street, where he established arguably Liverpool's premier real ale free house. The Ship subsequently became an institution both locally and nationally where drinkers would come to enjoy a host of novel real ales.

Dave's mother was from Belgium, which led to him acquiring a range of beers and lagers from that country. Nowadays, continental brews are commonplace. Dave's wife Evelyn encouraged him to initiate popular beer festivals within the pub which have now been transformed into the biannual events at Hulme Hall in Port Sunlight under the management of current owner Ben Garner.

Dave was an excellent cook and a range of lunches was offered to both local office staff and regulars from nearby John Moores University. Among those regulars was the late Andy Greenwood who recruited me to CAMRA. Within the pub, Dave was always keen to maintain the highest standards including keeping the copper bar polished and gleaming after the pub had closed.



Under Dave's stewardship the Ship deservedly won CAMRA's Pub of the Year on many occasions. Most memorable were the presentations on the roof of the Royal Liver Building arranged by branch Chair Peter Fane. Dave and Evelyn were both CAMRA members and were active in recruiting others to the Campaign. He served as secretary on the local branch Committee.

No assessment of Dave would be complete without an anecdote. Lyn Perrow, who provided much of the information for this article, gave me this one. A customer entered the Ship shortly after opening and sat on an empty bar stool. Nobody seemed within earshot. Dave's head appeared suddenly and almost miraculously from beneath the bar counter and told him. "Do you know you're in my seat?" A man of few words but one who always knew how to make his point.
